

<p>1. <i>Cornus nuttallii</i> - Pacific Dogwood. A Dunsmuir native plant - our City tree. Blooms in spring.</p>		<p>11. <i>Lilium Washingtonianum</i> ssp. <i>Washingtonianum</i> - Shasta Lily. A local native, also known as the Washington Lilly, its fragrant flowers bloom in early summer.</p>
<p>2. Crevice rock Garden - built in 2010 by Josef Halda, master rock garden designer from the Czech Republic, of scoria, a basaltic lava rock from Siskiyou County. It was planted with alpine plants naive to our surrounding mountain ranges in 2011.</p>		<p>12. <i>Pedicularis densiflora</i> - Indian Warrior. A native plant that is parasitic on the roots of other plants. Blooms in spring.</p>
<p>3. Penstemon Garden - planted in May 2014, it contains ten species of Penstemon native to Siskiyou County. As it matures its specimens will range from 4" to 4' high.</p>		<p>13. <i>Woodwardia fimbriata</i> - Giant Chain Fern. A local, native fern - one of the largest of the American Ferns. Fronds can reach up to five feet in length.</p>
<p>4. <i>Rhododendron stenopetalum</i> 'Linearifolium' - Spider Azalea. Native to Japan, introduced to the US in 1980. It is fragrant - unique among the azaleas. Blooms in spring.</p>		<p>14. <i>Sciadopitys verticillata</i> - Japanese Umbrella Pine. This unique evergreen, coniferous tree originated in the cloud forests of Japan. It's an ancient tree with a history dating from the earliest days of the dinosaurs - a true "living fossil".</p>
<p>5. Over 30 varieties of Hosta, Plantain Lily, are featured in the Gardens. Enjoyed for their foliage more than their bloom.</p>		<p>15. <i>Acer Palmatum</i> 'Ukigumo' - Floating Clouds Japanese Maple. One of the most extreme of the variegated Japanese Maples. The leaves have extravagant white markings with pink tips and highlights.</p>
<p>6. <i>Cornus</i> 'Venus' - Venus Dogwood. A cross between our native dogwood and the Korean dogwood. It has exceptionally large, creamy white flowers (bracts).</p>		<p>16. <i>Hakonochlor macra</i> 'All Gold' - Japanese Forest Grass. A native of Japan, clumps of this gracefully arching grass spread slowly by underground runners but is never invasive.</p>
<p>7. <i>Viburnum macrocephalum</i> 'Chinese Snowball'. Big, rounded 6" -</p>		<p>17. Many varieties of Japanese maples thrive in the Gardens.</p>

<p>8. <i>Neviusia cliftonii</i> - Shasta Snow-wreath. A rare native perennial shrub, it was thought to be extinct until 1992. It is found only in northern California around the margins of Shasta Lake. Blooms in spring.</p>		<p>18. <i>Acer circinatum</i> - Vine Maple. A local native, its leaves change from red-tinted green in spring to orange and scarlet in the fall.</p>
<p>9. <i>Cercis canadensis</i> 'Forest Pansy' - Forest Pansy Eastern Redbud. A purple-leaved form with hot pink flowers in spring.</p>		<p>19. <i>Silene californica</i> - California Indian Pink. A Siskiyou County native, this perennial has clusters of flaming red flowers with cleft and fringed petals.</p>
<p>10. <i>Cercis canadensis</i> 'Hearts of Gold' - Hearts of Gold Eastern Redbud. Lavender flowers precede foliage that opens pink, matures to lime and gold, then shades of green.</p>
